PLAYWRIGHT'S NOTE

"Just because we're magic doesn't mean we're not real."

—Jesse Williams (actor/activist)

This epitaph proceeds the first page of *Counting* because I am *real*. Black people are *real*. Our right to live is *real*.

Counting was born out of my desperate need to pour out my rage, anguish, helplessness, and exhaustion of being a Black woman constantly bearing witness to the brutalization of Black American bodies, onto the page. There is always a news story of state sanctioned violence being visited upon Black people. Most recently Stephon Clark has been added to the long list of names. News pundits speak of these victims as if they summoned their own death, for being "thugs." This denies Black people their humanity. It denies the sanctity of human life that goes beyond the complex politics of race. This fact is simple, Black people are *REAL*, their lives *COUNT*, and they have the right to *BREATHE*.

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

The history of African-Americans in America is a living history lesson. Despite the progress that has been made, the racism that permeates America is never ending. The possibility always exists, no matter how low or high your place is in American Society, as a person of color you remain a target.

Gray's character in *Counting* says, *"Tiredness, sadness, frustration, something in between. Cause they was living in a place where they was forgotten.*" As artists, we have the ability to make sure that ALL the ones who are forgotten are remembered. Aja Houston has created a moving, impactful, poignant and powerful piece of theatre brought to life by an outstanding cast. It reminds us that the lives and deaths of Emmett Louis Till, Trayvon Benjamin Martin, Sandra Bland, Freddie Carlos Gray and Sheneque Proctor, and all the others who have (and may) become part of the Count, are NEVER FORGOTTEN.

BIOGRAPHIES

Aja Houston is an actress and playwright. She received her Bachelor of Theatre Arts Degree from Pitzer College in Claremont, CA. Aja is now a MFA Dramatic Writing Candidate at USC School of Dramatic Arts Class of '19. She is a proud member of The League of Professional Theatre Women, Actors Equity Association, British Actor's Equity, and the Dramatists Guild. Her play Journey to Alice is currently being workshopped as a part of Inkwell Theatre's New Play Development Lab (Los Angeles). Some of Aja's other notable work includes The Flight of Emina and Zubaida, an adaptation of classic Polish novel "The Saragossa Manuscript", commissioned by Playwright's Arena (Los Angeles) and The Adam Mickiewicz Institute (Poland) for their 2017 Iron Tongues Staged Reading Festival and Floating On Credit (published by The Dionysian, 2017) For more information visit ajahouston.net

Nancy received a NAACP Best Actress award for Passing & Best Actress Nomination for Flyin' West at the St. Louis Black Repertory Company. In addition to many theatre & T.V. credits, she was in the iconic films Hollywood Shuffle, I'm Gonna Git You Sucka!, Menace to Society, and The Court Martial of Jackie Robinson.
