William Shakespeare is considered the greatest playwright in the English language, and Othello is considered one of his four greatest tragedies: along with Hamlet, Macbeth and King Lear. The Elizabethan Hamlet changed the face of theater, and the Jacobean Othello, Macbeth and King Lear were written in fairly quick succession and were each staggering achievements. The history of Othello in production is an interesting one, as for hundreds of years the character of Othello, the Moor, was often played by white actors who would create their Othellos with makeup and characterization: two famous examples are Laurence Olivier and my father, Richard Burton. In 2020, the role of Othello is rightly only ever played by actors of color, and nine wonderful actors in the second year MFA class at USC play all the indelible characters in this majestic play; we also have a male actor playing a female role (as did

Shakespeare's all male company in the original production) and our female actors playing male roles. We currently live in a country and a world where fear of "the other" is prevalent. With Othello, Shakespeare creates a story where he pits the general, Othello, "the other," against an elitist Venetian society when he secretly marries the Venetian aristocrat, Desdemona. He is reluctantly accepted because of his military prowess, only to be outwitted by his duplicitous ensign, lago, whose bitterness at being passed over as Othello's lieutenant ignites a trajectory that ends in tragedy; a tragedy that, as lago says, "will enmesh them all." Shakespeare writes for both his and our time, constantly amazing us with the universality of his stories. We are blessed to be able to explore this work of genius and present it to you with vigor and passion. Welcome to Venice and Cyprus and to the world of Othello.

#### DIRECTOR'S BIO

Kate Burton, a professor of the practice at USC, has directed the USC School of Dramatic Arts BFAs in Twelfth Night and in Gorky's Children of the Sun. She also directed Chekhov's Three Sisters, as well as The Cherry Orchard and The Seagull for USC's MFA Rep. Burton has directed three evenings of Shakespeare/Tchaikovsky for the Los Angeles Philharmonic, conducted by Gustavo Dudamel. As an actress, she has most recently appeared in Coriolanus and Cymbeline at NYC's Delacorte Theater in Central Park and played Prospera in The Tempest at San Diego's The Old Globe. A three-time Tony nominee, she has appeared in 12 Broadway productions as well as Off-Broadway, Williamstown, Bay Street, Boston's Huntington Avenue Theatre and Los Angeles' The Ahmanson and Mark Taper Forum. A three-time Emmy nominee, she is best known for her work on Scandal and Grey's Anatomy. She is a graduate of Brown and The Yale School of Drama.
