Larry Powell is a writer, actor, director and producer born and raised in South Central LA. As an actor he has originated and premiered roles in some of the most exciting new plays in America, including The Christians by Lucas Hnath, The Legend of Georgia McBride by Matthew Lopez, Father Comes Home From The Wars by Suzan Lori Parks, Seared by Theresa Rebeck, Brokeology by Nathan Louis Jackson, Curve of Departure by Rachel Bonds, and While I Yet Live by Billy Porter, to name a few. He is a two-time Ovation Award nominee, three-time NAACP Theatre Award Nominee, San Francisco Bay Area Theatre Award Nominee, two-time LA Drama Critics Circle Award Winner, as well as an Audelco and Audie award nominee. You can check him out as Lawrence in the movie The Browsing Effect (now available on streaming services). Larry is also a published playwright and professional screenwriter. He most recently finished writing on upcoming feature film, BARS, and his play Lost Dog will premiere in Los Angeles at Los Angeles Theatre Center in Spring 2020. As a director, he has worked with several contemporary playwrights directing staged readings and workshop productions across the nation. He has also directed on his own feature film project Mother's Milk. He has been mentored by the likes of Michele Shay, Phylicia Rashad (Assistant Director; Center Theatre Group's production of August Wilson's Ma Rainey's Black Bottom) and Elizabeth Van Dyke. He is a proud graduate of Carnegie Mellon's School of Drama. He dedicates this production to the delicate art of letting go.

### The Minotaur

**DIRECTOR'S NOTE** 

"The stage turns into a boat around them, and the sea around that. Maybe the boat is also made of yarn. The chorus makes the sounds of the wind and the waves."

Anna Ziegler's *The Minotaur* is an ensemble-based, hyper-theatrical play. It demands the use of movement, magical realism and devised theatre to build a visual language between itself and its audience. In the rehearsal process, we begin by over-generating options. We're able to see patterns surface in the movement language and identify where the visual storytelling is oversaturated, and where it is skeletal. Most importantly, we begin to impose strict rules on ourselves to ensure that the play sustains a cohesive physicality and aesthetic through the end. With *The Minotaur*, we've taken a vast, empty space and infused it with a specific movement language, a visual vocabulary, and structure. It's perhaps the perfect exercise in impossible theatre.

Jonathan Muñoz-Proulx is an Ovation Award-nominated director and is Director of Cultural Programming at A Noise Within. He serves on the Latinx Theatre Commons National Advisory Committee, is a member of the LA STAGE Alliance Ovation Rules Committee, and is a nominator for The Kilroy List. Muñoz-Proulx has previously served as Associate Producer of Skylight Theatre, as Artistic Assistant at East West Players, and as Vice Chair of the Alliance of Los Angeles Playwrights. He has adjudicated on grant panels for the California Arts Council and the Los Angeles County Arts Commission. Muñoz-Proulx's directing credits include One Flew Over The Cuckoo's Nest (Ovation Award, After Hours Theatre Company), How We're Different From Animals (Stage Raw Award, Élan Ensemble), Copland's America (Los Angeles Philharmonic), Charlotte Stay Close (Ensemble Studio Theatre/LA), I Am to Die Soon (Pacific Resident Theatre), and Follow (Watts Village Theatre Company).
