

### **DIRECTOR'S NOTE**

"A play is a blueprint of an event: a way of creating and rewriting history through the medium of literature." —Suzan-Lori Parks

The journey of Jaclyn Backhaus' play Men on Boats provides a contemporary snapshot of the historic geographic expedition of 1869, led by naturalist John Wesley Powell and nine other white men through the Green and Colorado Rivers of the Grand Canyon. This story is set against the backdrop of discovery and innovation of the great frontier of the American west and manifest destiny. Backhaus places this historic moment from the past into sharp focus of the present by recasting the lens through which we experience this story. This moment in history is reimagined by an expedition or ensemble of multi-cultural women who tell this tale and discover the natural wonders of this beautiful landscape. Through their eyes and her-story, we find ourselves investigating the following questions: Who has been forgotten or left out of history and why? Who has the agency or power to explore and claim land, territory, and name it as their own? What is the relationship between man, woman, humanity and the land—natural elements of the world? What is the significance of legacy in relationship to history? How are moments in history remembered? Who lives, who dies, and who tells your story?

### DIRECTOR'S BIO

Anita Dashiell-Sparks is an associate professor of theatre practice at USC, associate dean of equity, diversity and inclusion and has taught performance and critical studies courses in multi-cultural theatre for 18 years at the USC School of Dramatic Arts. For over 20 years, Dashiell-Sparks has centered diversity, equity and inclusion issues and initiatives in her career in theatre and higher education. As an actor, she has performed on Broadway, off-Broadway, and in regional theaters such as the Mark Taper Forum and the Geffen Playhouse. As a director of shows such as Letters from Zora and a producer, her creative work and scholarship have been seen in theaters across the country, including the Pasadena Playhouse and the Tony Award-winning Crossroads Theater. As an equity and diversity advocate in the arts, she has received numerous grants and awards (Fox Foundation, U.S. Dept. of Justice) for creating theatre for social change programs for at-risk youth in New York and Los Angeles. Dashiell-Sparks is trained as a National SEED (Seeking Educational Equity and Diversity) Leader/Facilitator, and is also the founding director of the "Building Bridges" leadership and empowerment theatre program through USC's Neighborhood Outreach, regularly directs theatre productions at the USC School of Dramatic Arts including Intimate Apparel, The Bluest Eye, Venus, Antigone X and An Octoroon.
