NOTE FROM THE ARTISTIC TEAM

Musical theatre is an art form that is constantly under construction. As audiences evolve, musical theatre evolves right along with them, and no one has contributed more to that evolution than Stephen Sondheim. Sondheim's art isn't easy. The music is crunchy and complicated, and it doesn't always go where you think it's going to. The lyrics can be challenging, and they have a tendency to turn around on themselves when you least expect it. But, it's this complexity and tension that makes Sondheim's work so resonant — life is crunchy and complicated, and it doesn't always go where you think it's going to. Moving through the world as a human being can be challenging, and it can turn around on you when you least expect it. Sondheim did what artists do; he used his unique gifts to shine a light on what it means to be a human being.

There's a lot of Sondheim out there right now, and that's great news for audiences. As musical theatre continues to evolve, Sondheim's musicals will resonate more deeply as audiences discover what Stephen Sondheim knew all along. The world is a messy place. Paths aren't straight. Two opposite things can be true at the same time. The hard but simple, regretful but happy, red/blue/purple-ness of our lives are what define us as human beings. That complexity and joyful tension defines what it means to be alive.
