Hey Girlboss, welcome to the show!

"When I close my eyes...I'm my most authentic self...

Everyone likes me and can see me for who I am, I can see
me for who I am. It isn't cloudy or unclear, it's me as I was
as a child, it's me in my purest form."

This is how our heroine, Abigail, describes the "amazing version of myself in my head...[that] feels impossible to get to" in the early moments of *I'll Get You My Pretty*. Her fantasy is one of acceptance, authenticity, and connection. Yet, with eyes open, gazing upon her reflection, Abigail is beset by a literal monster—one who torments her with her physical flaws and personal inadequacies.

Abigail is not alone; each character in this play is on a quest for purpose. Their quests—filled with quick fixes and faulty support systems—force each of them to confront their inner monsters or, as in the 1939 film from which the title is drawn, their inner "wicked witches."

Playwright Jenny Rachel Weiner once said:

"Heavy drama is like looking at the sun. I want to deal with the same emotions and themes as a serious drama. I'm masking it as something else. You can't look at the sun."

The characters of *I'll Get You*, *My Pretty* will likely be relatable to anyone who has doubted their lovability, compared themselves unfavorably to another, or sought meaning in their lives. The chaotically hilarious world you are about to enter is a reminder that we are not alone, and that perhaps the journey towards purpose need not be taken quite so seriously. We don't need to look at the sun, we need to look to community (one that uplifts, not one that makes you sell BabeShakes™).
