NOTE FROM THE ARTISTIC TEAM

Of all the comedies Shakespeare wrote, surely *Much Ado About Nothing* sounds and feels the most contemporary. That is partly because most of the text is in prose, with less of the verse common to all of his plays. But more importantly, it is the delicious vivacity of that prose which makes this play feel so modern. This vivacity has its full expression in the "merry war of wits" between Beatrice and Benedick.

Scholars have suggested that there is a pun in the title, because to Elizabethans, the word "nothing" sounded the same as the word "noting"— watching or observing. Indeed, most of the plot-turns involve a character overhearing, observing, and then, misconceiving. The results are both comic and tragicomic.

Enjoy "noting" these noters as we travel to a villa in the Italian countryside where lovers sophisticated and naive, a bona fide villain and a lowly constable with a penchant for malaprops make much ado with riotous consequences.
